Good Night, Sleep Tight!

We all know sleep is very important to us. Some of us already know getting enough sleep as we age isn't always easy. Dr. Laura Konever, MD tells us that sleep deprivation affects us in many ways. We probably already are aware of that. It can impair our judgment and increase our chance of accidents, among many things. Good sleep helps maintain our weight, which studies have proven. Sleep helps support a healthy mood; it protects our brain.

This Dr. supports the concept of taking a nap to supplement our night time sleep. If we go to bed over tired, that could be a reason for sleeplessness also. She also mentions taking time for daily activity is important. Simply getting up and taking breaks from sitting would help. If possible, getting some fresh air and sunshine doesn't hurt a bit.

A newsletter from the Mayo Clinic indicates that heavy exercise like Aerobics Class later in the evening revs up some people too much. They say as we age, our sleep patterns change. Our biological clock tends to reset a little earlier. That means we are likely to start to feel sleepy earlier in the evening, and we wake up at an earlier time in the morning. Even the Mayo Clinic supports napping during the day, if it not longer than 30-40 minutes or does not occur late in the day. Common sense, right?? This type of napping is less likely to interfere with night time sleep.

More common sense----they suggest reserving your caffeine drink for only in the morning, if it does bother you. The Mayo Clinic mentions that alcohol is another culprit. If large amounts (or even small amounts) are consumed before bedtime, it may help you fall asleep faster; but produces a more fragmented sleep. Of course, they suggest not eating a heavy meal before bed time.

Mindfulness meditation is a stress-reduction technique that can be so simple that people often don't realize its effectiveness. This is being aware of the present moment and letting go of everything else. Focus on what is happening----the sinking of your body into the bed, the softness of your pillow, the slowing of your breath---- and keeping your mindfulness there helps to drive away stressful thoughts about other things. It's worth a try.

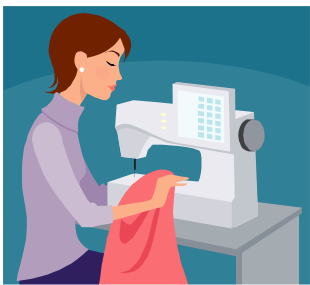
As you prepare to attend a training meeting, please consider giving some thought to questions you want to ask. That way you can get the most from the session. Presenters almost always are happy to address your questions.

Around 9,000 people die each day because of what is being used to cook, light and heat their homes.

A new report in the Lancet shows that 3 billion people worldwide are exposed to household air pollution (HAP) through the burning of solid fuels such as coal, charcoal, wood and crops. It is one of the biggest environmental factors leading to morbidity causing 6 times as many deaths as second-hand-smoke.

GRANDPARENTS UNIVERSITY

In July this year, Grandparents University will again take place on the UW-Madison campus. There are three sessions and grandchildren from ages 7-14 are eligible.

Something NEW for this year is that all grandparents attending must be members of the Wisconsin Alumni Association. (This does not mean, however, that they are graduates of one of the UW campuses.) The annual membership for an individual is \$55 if the grandparent is under 65 and \$45 if the grandparent is over 65. If two grandparents wish to attend, then a joint annual membership is needed which is \$65 if the grandparents are under 65 and \$55 if they are over 65.

Forging Connections—Making New Members

A meeting on membership was presented at the state conference in September. Kristy Sand, the incumbent state membership chairperson, introduced the topic with statistics, including:

75% of HCE membership is over 65.

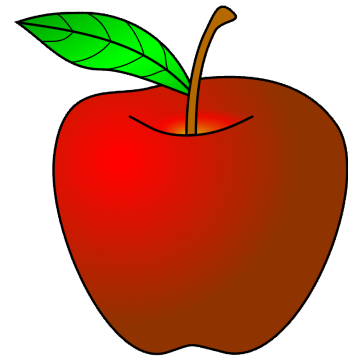
The number of Wisconsin HCE members have gone from (approximately, by my memory) 24,000 in 1990 to 3700 in 2016.

New strategies for reaching more people in the community are clearly warranted. Several counties told of successes in gaining members; each had a unique approach. Shawano Co. invited women who are part of an ongoing “Strong Women, Strong Bones” group. Sheboygan Co. described “focus groups” that are add-ons to the Core Discussion Group (leader training-type meetings). One focus is a book club including members and others from the community. Marathon Co. has been acting as an auxiliary for a volunteer firefighter organization. Through these alliances, membership in HCE has been explained and offered. These and other initiatives were presented with enthusiasm.

The great thing about WAHCE Conferences the gathering of people , getting together with the same things in mind, meeting new people, seeing old friends and learning about the facts of life. It was great. I attended many sessions – How to Age with Grace and Vigor, History of the Handkerchief, Choosing the Right Apple and Cooking with Wine.

The presenter of the Apple session was Jerry Clark the Chippewa County UWEX Ag Agent. Apple trees do not self-pollinate-. They need a like tree (apple family) flowering at the same time. They do not like to be in standing water. Blossoms can be in 28 degree temperature no longer than two hours. It is recommended to have your soil tested as the proper PH is important. Prune branches before flower budding (Feb or March). Keep trim so tree does not get too high for easier picking. Control diseases using a red ball such as Christmas ornaments to control apple maggots. Do not spray during flowering. Keep clean around the bottom of the tree – cut grass and pick up sticks.



There are numerous varieties available for cooking –Lodi, Cortland, Jonathon, Wealthy, Harrison some can only be gotten at a given orchard. Sweet Tarago and Red Free.

The next WAHCE Conference is in Wisconsin Dells – September 2017. Can't get closer to home. Make plans to attend.
